Conductor's Comments - Larry Burkholder, President

Our next regular club meeting will be Sunday, April 6th. We will have a very short business meeting to cover anything that I am not up to date on due to our travels most of March. Our museum open house will be on the 20th.

As I write my part for the Scoop this month my wife and I are just finishing two weeks touring New Zealand. It has been a great trip with friendly people and beautiful scenery everywhere. I have only gotten to photograph a few railway subjects, but we did do a 4.5 hour ride on their Tranz Alpine Express across the southern NZ Alps. It was spectacular, but would be even better in a couple months when they get snow. NZ passenger rail is privately owned and, like in the US, is quite limited in coverage. Of course, there are only a half dozen rail lines covering the country. There are only about 5 mm people in NZ and about 2 mm of them live in Auckland. They also don't produce much here, so freight transport by rail is relatively small. Since most things are imported they are quite expensive compared to the same thing in the US. Of course, the slide in the value of the US dollar doesn't help us travelers.

According to Kel Shearson, Superintendent of the New Zealand Division of the Australasian Region of NMRA, there is a reasonable model railroading community in NZ, with about 2000 known. However, only about 25 are NMRA members. There is a NZ MR meeting held every two years. Most do their own thing without club affiliation. Others stick to special interest groups. There are four small clubs in Auckland. I visited a large modern-day multidecked HO operating layout in Auckland that is considered the best in NZ. The layout owner likes BNSF, but his operating partners add their own favorite road names. Kel Shearson is located in Wellington and models Nickel Plate Road in HO. His layout is large and is also set up for operations. NZ railroads are narrow gauge and are modeled as Sn3.5. Hobby shops sell this gauge, but because of the limited rail service most modelers model US or European railroads. I am also meeting with a couple model railroaders here in Christchurch this afternoon. Both model US and one is in N scale. I am told that there are essentially no layouts set up in Chiristchurch at this time. Most are portable modules. I have a number of pictures of the two large HO layouts, but can not down load them to my computer now, so can not include any for this issue. I will post some on our web page after we get home.

Since I have been out of touch, hopefully our division coordinators can cover any issues or news of interest to the club.

We continue to address track problems. And have fixed several more. Thinking back on the ones that have been fixed, nearly all of these were caused by the sub-roadbed and roadbed being uneven, and causing dips or kinks in the rails. Gauge of the track has seldom been a problem.

There have been more few cars have been checked now for weight, coupler height, and so on, and more still need to be done. This is being done by several dedicated members.
