## Conductor's Comments - Larry Burkholder, President

Our regular November meetings will be from 1 to 4 pm on Sunday the 1st and Sunday the 15th. We will have a short business meeting on the 1st starting at 4:15 pm. The 15th is our regular museum open house.

The museum's fund raising gala will be held on Friday, December 4th starting at 6 pm. We will be expected to run all our trains from then until about 7:30. We also need volunteers to work the bar starting at 6 pm and serve wine during the meal from about 7 until 8 pm. Everyone is asked to wear their club shirts.

This is a big-deal event, so we want to present our best image, which also includes having the club rooms clean and neat. Another need is to help set up the lighting for the Christmas Garden. Mark Fuhrman has agreed to have his crew help with the main lighting again this year, but we will need to have additional lighting for the buildings and other areas set up by us. Ken Klipple is coordinating that part of it and will be calling for a work detail sometime before, or just after, Thanksgiving.

#### **HO Division - Alex Cameron**

Here are the dates for November, 2009. The next regular club Sunday meeting will be on the first Sunday, November 1. The third Sunday, November 15, will be an operating session, starting about 1:30. Saturday work sessions will be on November 7 and November 21, starting about 9:30. Thursday work sessions will be on November 5, 12, and 19, starting at 9:30. The forth Thursday, November 26, is Thanksgiving, and there will be no work session that day. We have a fifth Sunday in November, the 29, and that will be a work Sunday.

The attendance on Thursdays has been about average. Saturdays has been only 2 or 3 hardcore attendees. We had good attendance for the October operating session, with two crews for most of the trains, and we ran all of the trains. The last several months the operating sessions have been going quite well. It must be about time to complicate things again by putting a scheduled passenger train into the mix. I have been working on the passenger train operation and we will add at least one passenger train for the November session.

Work continues on the mountain in the corner, and the engine terminal.

We had two cases of what I call 'phantom' shorts; one in Lumberton, and the second in the Raccoon Creeks modules. I think that we have fixed the one in Lumberton. We found that two of the power districts were interconnected, and have fixed that and removed and simplified wiring in the process. The Raccoon Creeks one is still being worked on.

Several people have been looking at passenger and freight cars and checking couplers height and coupler operation.

We continue to work on operating problems as we encounter them. We actually had a Tortoise switch machine fail. It had been drilled into inadvertently, and

that may have had something to do with it. We have noticed that the overall operating reliability of the layout has increased, so our work on fixing problems is paying off.

Curt and I are still operating on Tuesday AM. Remember to bring locomotives and controllers for the operating session.

### N/Z-Scale Activities - Bruce McElhoe

Each time we gather, our DCC discussions seem to develop into better potential track modifications. The goal is toward a two track main thus stepping away from the current N-Trak design. Potential track designs are floating around for some initial review and comments. We will plan on continuing these discussions at upcoming gatherings. My latest thoughts are to have an arrival/departure yard, an interchange yard, and a remote interchange track that interlaces two independent mainline systems. Food for thought!

We continue running in the DCC mode at all of our recent gatherings. Some of us have taken advantage to Hobby Town's 30% discount offer for any Digitrax products. I know that I have four decoders on the list to convert an ABBA set of Intermountain F7's. With others doing the same we will have (for us n-scalers) a large fleet of decoder equipped motive power available.

The peninsula DCC compatibility still has issues coming off the #2 main. The #2 wye tracks are dead but easily fixed with moving some electrical jumpers between terminal blocks under the module. Otherwise, the auto reversing section is working perfectly once in the peninsula area regardless of which track you are using.

In our last Scoop I reported that Greg Wroblicky's new UT-4R throttle was DOA and would only work when plugged in. He was able to return the unit for a swap and the replacement is operating correctly. On the subject of throttles, I recently had some communication problems but determined that the battery was low. I learned this while trouble shooting the auto reversing section on the peninsula. It kept losing contact and I would be required to plug in and reacquire the engine. Swapped batteries using some we've had at the museum but still had the issue. I found that these had been drained over time and so were removed from service. A new pack of 9V's solved my throttle problems. This is old news to those experienced with the world of DCC but it is fresh stuff to remember on the n-scale side.
